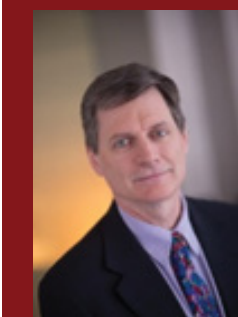

Dr. William Brieger

MPH, CHES, DrPH (Atunluse of Idere, Otun Ba'asegun of Igbo-Ora), Professor, Health Systems Program, Dept of International Health, The Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health.

Dr. Brieger was based at the African Regional health Education Center in the University of Ibadan, Nigeria. He continues to work on projects in Nigeria and other African Countries through Jhpiego and other USAID grantees. He has conducted major research focused on learning about the social, cultural and behavioral aspects of health and illness, especially in tropical contexts with an emphasis on programs designed around primary health care, community participation and health education. He has endeavored to learn about health and health care from the community's perspective in order to develop communication bridges between consumers and providers, to learn appropriate community participation mechanisms and to strengthen community capacity during intervention research.



Dr. Patricia M. Davidson

PHD, MED, RN,
Dean, The Johns Hopkins School of Nursing

A former Director of the Centre for Cardiovascular and Chronic Care at the University of Technology Sydney [Australia] and Professor of Cardiovascular Nursing Research at St Vincent's Hospital Sydney, Dr. Davidson has an established program of research in supporting individuals living with chronic conditions and developing innovative models of transitional care. A primary objective of her work has been to improve the cardiovascular health of underserved populations through development of innovative, acceptable, and sustainable initiatives within Australia and beyond. She has secured over \$8 million in competitive research funding from national and international funding bodies, and co-authored 290-plus peer-reviewed journal articles, 18 book chapters, and more than 70 peer-reviewed abstracts.



Andrés R. Martinez

Fmr. Bloomberg News, Bureau Chief West Africa

He is currently a trainer on the Bloomberg News training and standards team. A journalist with more than fifteen years of experience reporting from four continents Previously, he served as the bureau chief in Argentina, where he oversaw coverage of the 2017 financial crisis. From 2013 to 2016, he was the Bureau Chief of more than a dozen countries in West Africa and led Bloomberg News' coverage of the 2013 Ebola epidemic in West Africa. Prior to that he worked in Johannesburg to cover the economies and governments of Southern Africa. Martinez joined Bloomberg News in 2007 in Mexico City, where he covered the state oil company and general news in the region, including the swine flu epidemic and the 2009 coup in Honduras. Prior to working at Bloomberg News he was a crime and courts reporter at The Monitor newspaper in McAllen, Texas.

A Foreign Service Officer, joined USAID in 2005. She most recently served as the Director of the Health Office in USAID/Guinea and USAID/Sierra Leone. Ms. Chappell previously held positions as Director of the Health and HIV teams in Côte d'Ivoire, South Africa and Nigeria, leading those large and complex health programs through significant transitions. Prior to joining USAID, Ms. Chappell worked on reproductive health, HIV/AIDS, and maternal health issues primarily in francophone West Africa. She has her MPH from Tulane and speaks French.

Ambassador of the Republic of Ghana to the United States of America.

This is his second Ambassadorial appointment after having served as Ambassador of Ghana to Japan with concurrent accreditation to Singapore, New Zealand, Australia and Papua New Guinea from 2001 - 2008. He obtained his first degree in Geography, from the University of Ghana, Legon. He attained the Master of Science degree from the University of Wisconsin - Milwaukee and a PhD from Indiana University in 1972. He further earned a Certificate in Counselling from the Center of Advancement, London in 1989. As a Development Advisor, he has proven himself as a dedicated public servant and a distinguished statesman. He has an ardent commitment to the pursuit of the socio-economic development of Ghana.



Gregory Simpkins

Senior Advisor, Africa Bureau, Office of Sustainable Development, U.S. Agency for International Development

Gregory is a specialist in African policy development. Prior to his current position, he served as Staff Director for the U.S. House Subcommittee on Africa, Global Health, Global Human Rights and International Organizations, where he advised the Chairman on policy issues, arranged Congressional hearings, drafted legislation and conducted oversight missions. Mr. Simpkins has testified before the U.S. Senate and House on trade, human rights and elections in Africa and provided background information on the changing political situations in various countries to U.S. Government officials in the executive and legislative branches. Mr. Simpkins also has served in a variety of positions in civil society, allowing him to help shape or implement U.S. policy on Africa, including three versions of the African Growth and Opportunity Act (AGOA).



Kevin Frick

Vice Dean for Education, JHU Carey Business School

Trained as a health economist, he received his PhD in Economics and Health Services Organization and Policy at the University of Michigan. Professor Frick has been with Johns Hopkins University since 1996, spending more than 16 years at the Bloomberg School of Public Health before becoming Vice Dean for Education at the Carey Business School in April 2013. He has published more than 180 peer reviewed journal articles, of which he is principal author on more than 60.



Dr. Ruben Atekpe

Group..

His first exposure to healthcare came from his father's business which dealt in medical supplies for the Ghanaian market. At one point the family business was responsible for over 75% of medical supplies on the Ghanaian market. He is currently working as a supplier of technology for handicapped persons in Ghana. He is also supporting a program to introduce a novel technology into the Ghanaian market which would reduce the incidence of malaria. In his capacity as the Executive Chairman of the MECOWA Group, he has been directly responsible for directly or indirectly establishing and representing several global brands in Ghana. These brands include: Duravit sanitary ware; Hansgrohe sanitary ware; Steel Case furniture;

Mr. Price Department Store; Truworhs Clothing; Identity Clothing; Nike; Comet Free Zones, Border Tax-Free shops; Kodak; Polaroid; Fuji; and Gillette amongst others. In many cases, the entry of these global brands into Ghana represented trail-blazing establishment of new industries or business models into Ghana, and many of these brands have gone on to become household names in Ghana. He is also founding member of the Ghana Malaysia Business Council which has presidents of both Ghana and Malaysia as Co-Chairmen. He advised both Singapore and Dubai trade offices in their establishment of regional offices in West Africa.

In many African countries, most healthcare facilities in cities and remote areas have limited access to high-tech diagnostic tools, thereby making it difficult to provide services that detect and differentiate infections that show the same symptoms when for example a patient is has malaria, typhus, yellow fever, or Ebola. But, Dr. Nyan's single-test is able to pin-point the infections or rule out others in less than an hour, making it faster and easier for doctors to give specific treatment at an affordable cost.

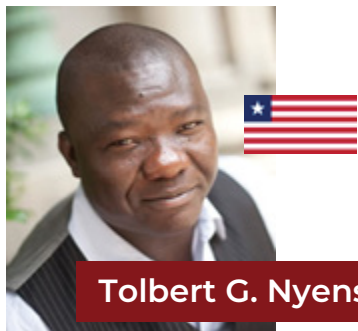

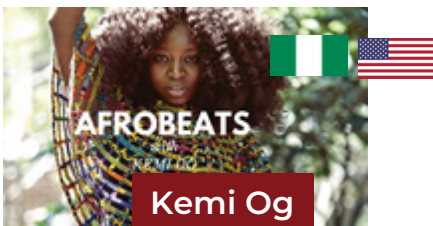
